A Message from the Pastor

EARTHQUAKE!

After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb. There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb rolled back the stone and sat on it... The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said..."
(Matthew 28:1-16)

Matthew's account of Easter includes a report of a great earthquake, and certainly Easter shakes the stuffing out of everything.

The two faithful women trudging toward the tomb expected everything to be the same, but things were never the same again after Easter. The world was split open with the revelation that life wins and death loses. Jesus is alive!

Not only does Easter shake up our dying; it shakes up our living. We know we have a great God. We know who to follow to God – Jesus! He not only brings us through death but through life. At the fault lines of our lives – in the midst of trouble, weakness, struggle – we have the living Lord helping us.

We can practice this presence of our living Lord with us in our daily lives trusting what he taught and living the life that is eternal even now. We do that by believing our great God who promises, "My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand."

"He is not here; he has risen, just as he said."

We invite you to join us on our Lenten journey, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 1) with a special worship service at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary.

On Easter Sunday (April 16) we will celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. Join us at 8:00, 9:15 or 11:00 as we proclaim the Good News that "He is Risen!"

May God bless you with a wonderful celebration of the resurrection!



In the past month, our Outreach & Family Ministries combined to put on one large event which was a free game and taco night on February 11th. This was an even bigger success than our previous ministry night as we had 47 people come out with 12 non-church attendees and a total of 35 that had not previously attended one of our ministry nights. Everyone had a great time playing games together and it was especially fun to see the younger kids enjoying Mr. Frog (a Hungry Hippo-esque game). I also want to give a huge thank you to the Klinger's for providing delicious tacos, quesadillas, and nachos!



I am currently working on planning another community event for March, but the specifics have not been nailed down at the moment. As soon as this has been decided and set in the calendar, we will start advertising again in our area. The desire is to continue to put on free events for our community so that we will be able to show our community how much we care about them and that we are a church that is open to them and their families. Currently, our next scheduled event is an **Easter Egg Hunt on April 8th**, which we will start advertising for next week as well as begin gathering our supplies. We are also in the early stages of our VBS program with an informational meeting set for February 26th and a **VBS decorating workshop on April 22nd**.

In regards to the ministries that I am working on starting, I was able to take 6 people from our church to experience **Celebrate Recovery** for themselves in Quakertown on February 14th. It was a great experience that helped to give a new perspective to all involved, including myself through various questions that arose from it. As for our **ESL & Tutoring/Mentoring programs**, the plan is to start training next week (Feb 27th - Mar 4) as people are available with the possibility of it being extended another week as need be in order to have the programs up and running quickly.

Jambo from Living Hope High School in Bungoma, our foreign mission in Kenya



If the students and Founder, Marilyn Uhl, could speak to us right now, they'd say "Jambo" (Hello) and "Bwana asifiwe" (Praise the Lord). Jarrettown Church holds a special place in the hearts of those at Living Hope as they never forget that our church family here on the other side of the world was responsible for digging the well that gave them fresh, clean water and therefore brought freedom from Typhoid. Jarrettown Church helped in raising funds to provide a van for emergency transport. In 2016 we helped raised money toward the \$50,000 needed to build a dispensary they are naming *The Healing Hut*.

My fourth trip to Living Hope began on December 29th when I left Newark Airport and flew with three large, filled-to-capacity suitcases to Amsterdam where I met the rest of the team that had flown from Dulles Airport in D.C. After flying on to Nairobi, the capital of Kenya, we bounced around during the 10 hour van ride which took us to Living Hope where we received a rousing welcome from students and staff. My heart was filled with joy as I hugged my adopted daughter, Zabby, who had come back to greet me after graduating on December 18th, 2016.

I couldn't wait for daylight to go to see the site of The Healing Hut. During the two weeks we were there, I delighted in seeing the progress on the building made of handmade bricks and cement.....a place where ill children will be able to go on campus to recover with medical care in a sterile, quiet environment. We are proud that one of our own former students, Nicodemus Simiyu, due to graduate from college in Building Construction next year, is foreman on the job. This much needed facility could have well been used on January 18th when 20 incoming freshmen arrived. 16 of the new students arrived ill with Typhoid!

Our fifteen days at Living Hope were long, beginning at 5:30 AM and ending after evening worship at 10PM. The temperature was unusually hot - reaching 115 one day. When I'm not at Living Hope, I forget how lucky I am at home to have a toilet, a shower, electricity, running water and not have the need to sleep with a mosquito net.

The focus of this year's work at Living Hope was teaching about Christmas.....Bible studies, games, in-depth study about the birthday of Christ, ending on Visitors' Day with a living manger scene (including a live camel that had been ridden 60 miles to get there for the day. Yes, I did ride it after the program). I taught the children Christmas carols, introducing singing in parts. Another of my jobs was holding a cooking club each afternoon for 12 students who learned to make some American dishes as well as cooking traditional Kenyan food.

The Evangelism Club went out into the Bush each day sharing the Good News of Christ to those who did not know Him. I had taken 20 "Messengers" which are solar-powered tools that contain encouraging messages by Dr. Charles Stanley. As small as a cell phone, the messages in both Swahili and English, give the new Christians God's word to hear after the missionaries have gone. Those new to the faith came to church services we held at Living Hope.



With great difficulty I selected 62 of my 700 photos to put on a flash drive to use when I share my experiences with groups. If you are in a group either in our church or elsewhere that might like to hear more of how God is at work at Living Hope, please give me a call (215-643-6086). I am so in awe of how God has blessed me with the opportunity to minister to His children on the other side of the world that I would consider it an honor to share more with you.

They provided food, clothing, baby supplies, help with resume writing, help with security deposit and other housing needs. I don’t know what I would have done without the volunteers over at the Community Cupboard. I will never forget what was done for me and my family in this time of need. St Philip’s Community Meal mission is to share with others the gift of God’s love through service, compassion, witness and life together. We are committed to sharing the good news of Jesus Christ through word and deed, calling people to salvation in Christ and to live the tenets of Christian faith in love and service to others. Over the course of the past 16 years our Community Meal program has supported and connected St Philip’s mission through devotions, relevant bible study, communion and prayer time. Our “journey of faith” programming has applied sound biblical teaching, spiritual ministry and fellowship. Our venue of ministry promotes: a belief in God, God’s love and care for me and God’s seeking personal relationship with us. Our community meal requires many hours of logistics support for meal preparation and program development.



- ◆ We feed an average of 55-60 people each Wednesday and our meals consist of a hot entrée, vegetables, bread, dessert and beverage.
- ◆ It takes about 28 man hours to support each meal.
- ◆ SP food cupboard provides about 6000 items/600 bags of dry groceries to the needy families.

We continue to need the following food items for the cupboard program:
Canned Fruits/Veggies/Tuna/Beef Stew, Cereal, PB&J, Mac & Cheese, Pasta Products Please leave your items in the Mission Center.



Your support of twin sized sheet sets and blankets are always welcome for the “Beds for Kids” **OHAAT** program! Collection bin in the mission hallway.

On the second Saturday of every month at 7:00am, a team of men and women meet in the JUMC parking lot to travel by the church van to the warehouse of a ministry known as OHAAT (“One House At A Time”). Our purpose in doing that is to help OHAAT fulfill its ministry to Philadelphia’s disadvantaged children, delivering mattresses, bed frames, personal hygiene items, books, and bedclothes to the families of kids who have been sleeping on bare floors, or in bathtubs, or even in cardboard boxes. **If the Lord is moving you to join us on one of these delivery days**, please contact the church office. Typically, we are finished for the day by noon.



LAUREL HOUSE OF NORRISTOWN SERVING MONTGOMERY COUNTY FOR 35 YEARS

— Laurel House is a shelter for those who are fleeing their home, or place of shelter because of feeling unsafe.

The mission of Laurel House is to provide a safe haven for abused women and their children, to bring awareness to the public and advocate for social change against Domestic Abuse.

Laurel’s Loft sells gently used clothing (less than 5 years old), housewares, jewelry, shoes and handbags. They are located at 1801 N. Broad St., Lansdale, (215-368-6037) and their hours are Monday, Wednesday and Friday, 10:00 to 5:00; Tuesday and Thursday 10:00 to 7:00; Saturday 10:00 to 4:00; Closed Sunday.

Socks For Shelters

Along with men’s socks, we are currently collecting men’s boxers (m-xl) and men’s t-shirts (m-xl), men’s light weight jackets, rain ponchos and sweatshirts (hoodies) and peanut butter crackers

Also personal care items including wash cloths, soaps, body wash, shampoo/conditioner, deodorant, toothbrush/paste, disposable razors, shaving cream, Band-Aids, q-tips, nail clippers, emery boards, refillable water bottles.

A Minute on Finance

Spring is right around the corner! What a wonderful winter we've had, although some might say not enough snow, preparing us for the new growth and sprouting of the spring blooms we know are coming. Kind of reminds us of Jarrettown and the wonderful image of all the children we see in church these days and the growth in knowing our Lord Jesus Christ which we see in them.

We ended 2016 with a surplus of \$20,606. This was applied to the capital reserves budget to use for future capital improvement needs. Our total giving in 2016 was down somewhat from last year but so were our expenses which allowed for the surplus. The decline in general giving was expected since we also had the bus campaign which raised another \$65,000. You surely have now seen the new bus and van in the parking lot. The surplus from 2015 filled the gap between the cost of the bus and van and the amount raised. Now we have comfortable and dependable transportation vehicles for our activities and church pickup.

We have our 2017 budget in place, but have decided to modify it to increase the amount allocated for the children's program in light of its growing needs. We view the budget as not a static but living guide which must be flexible to meet the changing needs of the programs and ministries we support.

The capital reserve budget continues to be monitored since we know the trustees have maintenance needs in sight which will need to be completed in the near future.

Thank you again for your ongoing financial support. We pray that God continues to bless you.

** Also..... Please join us for **Men's Devotions** led by Barry Rose every first and third Saturday in the Friendship Center 7am to 7:45 am. **



HAPPY NEW YEAR to you, our wonderful Jarrettown congregation! It was a most gratifying 2016 and we have your generosity to thank for it. First of all, the campaign to purchase a new bus and van may not sound like a mission-minded effort, but having those two new vehicles has enabled us to expand our offerings of outreach to several of our missions.

Next, it is probably important for you to be familiar with the people who are in the positions of responsibility of our various programs. George and Elaine Cahlink are (and have been for many years) providing meals and spiritual leadership to the neighbors and members of [St. Philip's UMC](#) in Kensington; Susan and Robert Baybutt head up the leadership of the [North Hills Community Center cupboard](#); Katie Noehrenberg is our chief gardener in the [Jesus Victory Garden](#); Connie Damon is our liaison and courageous wonder worker at [Living Hope High School](#) In Kenya.

Let's not leave out the members of our Women of Jarrettown circles who lead teams of volunteers: Vicki Zoscin heads the [Socks for Shelters](#) effort, both gathering donations and leading us twice a year to visit the Church Without Walls where we distribute needed personal items and clothing to homeless men and women; Becky Conrad does double duty - [Operation Christmas Child](#) boxes for Samaritan's Purse and the fund-raising [Clothing Drive](#). Joanne Schuler and the Martha Circle have championed [Laurel House](#) (a shelter for abused women and their children) for years, providing personal items and gift cards.

Wendy Hamilton and volunteers set up the [Angel Tree](#) every year to make sure kids in our Methodist Homes have Christmas presents; they also collect and distribute [school supplies](#) for our Interfaith and St. Philip families. Sue Diehl has taken on the tremendous role of coordinator for the [Interfaith](#) families who are our guests for the month of September. In 2017, we'll be giving more attention to all of our local [United Methodist Summer Camps](#) (Innabah, Gretna Glen and Pocono Plateau) so that our young families can start planning their children's summer activities. Michele Scholtz will be changing up the Flower Sale, adding a Pancake Breakfast to that fund-raising effort.

Finally, we give a shout-out to the United Methodist Men. They have been gathering once a month to deliver beds to kids ([OHAAT](#)) who haven't had one before. They go into neighborhoods and homes where things might be little rough, but they carry on (and often, up two or three flights of stairs) to get the job done. And now, they've taken a page from the Women of Jarrettown (WOJ) and decided to change their unofficial name to Men of Jarrettown Organization (MOJO, get it?).

Good news! It is not too late to volunteer to help with the **Jesus Victory Garden**. You, too, can be a part of supplying over a thousand pounds of fresh produce a year to our neighbors in need. We require people who want to commit themselves to an ongoing project and also want people who donate just a few hours. We accept monetary donations, too.

Gardeners take responsibility for one or more beds for the entire growing season. Volunteers need no prior gardening experience, as written instructions and in-person demonstrations are provided. Substitute gardeners cover beds when the regular gardeners are on vacation or ill.

There are many one-time or infrequent jobs available for people who want to help but do not want a long-term commitment. For example, we need someone who can replace rotting wood on the compost bin gate, someone who would like to turn the compost, and someone who would like to help prepare the garden (not the beds) for spring. Perhaps you would like to count and bag seeds or pick Japanese beetles from green bean leaves? This is a lovely opportunity to introduce children and grandchildren to the joys of gardening and helping others. Mature teenagers can have their own garden beds, and younger children can help the adult supervising them.
